Please keep looking for venues where these displays could be installed, talk to the owners and let me know if there is an interest.


Funding

Dear Lion Leader,

The coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic continues to impact the work of Lions and communities around the world, creating challenges for our clubs and the people we care for. Throughout this global crisis, Lions have continued to safely serve because the needs have been so great. To help ensure that clubs are able to meet the growing needs in our communities, the International Board of Directors passed another resolution to make it easier to invite new members to serve with us.

Here is an overview of the new resolution approved by the Board of Directors:

· Charter and entrance fees waiver – We have waived all charter and entrance fees from January 1 through June 30, 2022. Charter and entrance fees are also currently waived through December 31, 2021.

Please note that clubs should pay any outstanding balances right away to stay in good standing and avoid being placed on financial suspension on November 15.

We know that every member matters, to our clubs, to our communities and to the lives we touch as Lions. For more than a century, Lions have taken on the greatest challenges facing humanity, and together, we will overcome this.

Thank you for sharing the joy of being a Lion, and for your outstanding service and commitment to our communities and the world.

From LCIF Chairperson Dr. Jung-Yul Choi

It's Diabetes Awareness Month, and LCIF proudly supports our service addressing this disease. Of course, Lions' and Leos' important work in all cause areas takes funding. Therefore, Campaign 100 continues. I want to recognize India's District 318 B for helping lead campaign fundraising success. Also read how you could win complimentary registration to the 2022 Lions International Convention, and to learn how 100% of your donation to LCIF counts toward campaign and Melvin Jones Fellow or Lions/Leos Share recognition!

As we approach Christmas, I ask you all to consider the impact that we as Lions have in the world. Through LCIF, OUR Foundation, we have made grants totalling over \$US1.1 billion supporting Sight, Youth, Disaster Relief and Humanitarian efforts. Our Multiple District has received over \$3.6 million of that amount.

Campaign 100 was launched in 2017 with the aim of globally raising \$100 million in each of the following 3 years (extended to 4 because of Covid-19) so that we could make a significant positive impact on:

- The 400 million people with Diabetes
- · The 800 million who go to bed hungry
- The 253 million people blind or visually impaired
- The 245 people (mostly children) who die each day from Measles
- · That child diagnosed with cancer every 2 minutes
- The 15% annual increase in natural disasters, etc.

And we think we are hard done by with Covid.......

Through our Campaign 100, we have until the end of this Lions year, to raise the \$78 million worldwide to reach our \$300 million goal and we will do it.

While we enjoy Christmas, please give some thought to those in the groups above and how we might be able to make a difference to the way their lives are now. Let us give some hope to those suffering so that their Christmas will be a positive and memorable experience.

How can we contribute? As a Club, consider acknowledging the many years of service some of your members have given with a Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF). For \$US1,000, the recipient will receive an impressive plaque, a special MJF Lions pin and their name on the honour role at International Headquarters. What about nominating your MJF recipient as one of the 40 Heroes for Lions throughout our multiple District.

Many clubs have enough credits to award a MJF without any additional cost. (Contact me to see if your club qualifies.)

As an individual, consider purchasing a Lions Sharepin - \$75, \$150 or \$300 for a 1, 2 or 3 star pin respectively. Clubs can also purchase these to recognise the efforts of members. Both Area Leader Leo Danz and I have these available. One hundred percent of the money for both MJF awards and Sharepin purchases is used in LCIF projects.

\$1 in is \$1 out - the full donation amount is reinvested in LCIF funded projects.

Remember that all of us as Lions have ownership of LCIF (OUR Foundation) and every person helped from that list above, was helped by US, you and me – not some distant, nebulous organisation. We will continue to help because that is who we are – WE ARE LIONS.



Dear Megan

I am taking the unusual step of contacting you directly as District Governor. I want to share an important update regarding how COVID-19 has impacted Camp Quality. In these uncertain and challenging times, the vulnerable children we work with need respite and opportunities to be kids again more than ever. However, the danger COVID-19 poses has meant that we've made the difficult decision to cancel our upcoming Summer Camp programme. This will be the first time in our history that we've not been able to deliver any physical camps. It was a very hard decision but it's clearly the only one we could make to protect our children.

Despite this, we must still be there for our Campers. So, we're busily working on a new concept called Camp-in-a-Box which will bring the spirit of camp to the doorstep of every child who was registered to attend Summer Camp in 2022. Each box will be packed with toys, games, puzzles, books, resources, and activities. Every child will receive their own special box and an invitation take part in a range of on-line activities. The aim is to generate the kinds of amazing experiences and important outcomes from camp, but in a COVID-19 safe way.

Lions Clubs New Zealand, and your District in particular, have always been a central part of our physical camps. Thousands of children living with cancer have benefitted from your region's generosity and I want to sincerely thank you for that support.

Will you now be central in our response to the new reality COVID-19 imposes upon us? Will the Lions Clubs in your District help us fund the Camp-in-a-Box programme? Enabling every local child to still enjoy the spirit of camp, even in these challenging times.





Each box will cost approximately \$250, however in line with our Camp philosophy will be provided free to our Campers. Across the country, we're aiming to provide 400 boxes so that no child misses out this Summer. This is an ambitious plan, but we can't leave any child out and I know that together we can meet the challenge.

Across our Wellington and Central Districts, we have 81 children and young people to send a box to. So far, thanks to the generosity of Lions Clubs in your District, we already have sufficient funding for 65 boxes, which is just fantastic but we're 16 short of our target. We can't let this happen, we can't have 16 kids who won't be able to participate so, on their behalf, we're again asking for your help.

I am confident, that with your support we will be able send a box to every Camper. In fact,

I would like to aim higher so that any fundraising over and above our target for Camp-in-a-Box could be used to support our broader work across the region. Our camps (and now Camp-in-a-Box) are just part of what we do locally. We also provide support for parents looking for information and resources, run events that give children a chance to catch-up with their camp buddies while providing respite for their parents. We provide personalised support through the year with specially trained, volunteer Companions being there for Campers even outside of camp, and we provide a sense of hope and community for the hundreds of families and whanau affected by a cancer diagnosis.

The total cost of running Camp Quality in the region, outside of running physical camps, is approximately \$39,000 and we must fundraise every dollar. In these difficult and uncertain times, fundraising is so much harder. And so, we're asking Lions to also support the organisation that provides the camps, the camp boxes, the advice and support at the end of a phone, the fun, hope, happiness and community. Will you help us to be there for all the children and young people living with cancer in your District throughout the year?

Lions Clubs New Zealand have always been an incredibly valued members of the Camp Quality family and together we have given fun, hope and happiness to countless children and young people living with cancer. We would be delighted to come along to a Club and talk about our work and the important role Lions play in making it all possible.

Please accept our thanks for your support and together we can make a lasting difference in the lives of children and young people living with cancer, even in these uncertain and challenging times.

The rowing project to raise five million for Child Cancer, Surf Life Saving, Starship Hospital, The Lions Skin Cancer Bus (if it goes ahead) and a Trust that supports life saving drugs that are not funded by PHARMAC (if they can find one for the whole of New Zealand) starts in Bluff on the 12th of March, I was saying April, but it is the 12th of March. The rowing crew are travelling 40 kms a day depending on the weather and sea conditions, up the East Coast to Cape Reinga, they hope to be there by the 24th of July. A mammoth task and we need to

support them as much as possible. They have planned each stop at night and hope to be hosted by Lions clubs with accommodation and meals, they will do guest speaking about their project and hope to also have Olympic rowers meeting them and speaking.

We can help by raising funds with projects, baking stalls, rowing competitions, sponsorship, letters of support and encouragement, getting guest speakers and hosting dinners, donating the profit to the rowing effort and any other ideas you may have to help this very worthy effort which will also raise our Lions profile.

There will be a lot more information come out before the event starts as they are still planning at the moment. I will keep you all informed as I hear.

Kaponga Lions reported that they made good money from the last sale of kan tabs aluminium which is great to hear, so keep collecting please and get it to Kaponga, they are doing a magnificent jog. Kaponga are also taking glasses (Old Spectacles) down to the Karori Lions club in Wellington who are doing a great job with the glasses, so get your glasses to Kaponga before January too please.

I really enjoyed hearing about the GLOB at zone one meeting recently, this a fabulous project that zone one is managing and I know it is going to do marvellous things for the people around Feilding for their health.

Stephen Barr is also promoting the new Membership initiative and he is positive that this club driven three pronged focus to reinvigorate Lions is a great idea. Talk to Stephen about it and ask him to come to your zone meetings to get the message out to as many members as possible.

If are thinking of setting up a charitable trust to comply with recent changes in charities legislation, you are not alone. Many clubs are doing the same and we can help you with the process.

There are several parties that you will need to deal with along the way:

- Your club
- The charities commission
- Incorporated Societies
- Inland Revenue
- Your club's bank

We have developed a straightforward summary which details the steps you need to take when dealing with each of these parties. This is based on the experience of our club, which did this last year. Please contact me and I can send this to you.

There are 2 documents that you will need to use:

- 1. Charitable Trust Deed template
- 2. Standard Lions Club Constitution (latest version)

These are both templates that are simple to fill out. They have been approved by Lions, the Charities Commission, Incorporated Societies and Inland Revenue. Using these documents will streamline the process and ensure that we all operate by the same rules and stand together. I can send these to you as well.







CLUB NEWS

Lance Pedersen was doing his bit for the community, on his 83rd birthday, when he was the victim of a drug-fuelled attack.

In September, Pedersen was driving a dialysis patient up to Palmerston North Hospital in the Foxton Beach Community Health Shuttle, as he often did when volunteering for the service for the past six years.

Except this wasn't a regular trip. While waiting outside the hospital he was attacked by a man demanding the van. "You can't have it," Pedersen said.

The man then hit him in the face multiple times, but Pedersen was able to fight off the attacker with a "kick in the nuts."

His elbow also happened to hit the shuttle horn which was heard by a nurse who alerted security. However, by the time they got there the attacker had taken off, and Pedersen was on his way to A&E.

The attacker, Liam Anderson, 26, had been in hospital for a methamphetamine overdose and had discharged himself that morning.

At 3.30pm the same day, Pedersen got a call from police in New Plymouth to say Anderson had been arrested.

He had been picked up on unrelated warrant matters and had also assaulted two police officers while in the police cells. He was later sentenced to two years and two months in prison.

Pedersen has been back behind the wheel of the shuttle but has also had to scale back his contribution due to double vision. Doctors think he may have delayed concussion.

He also suffered significant bruising to his face and a cut to his lip during the assault.

Despite the attack, he was still keen to get back behind the wheel and do his bit for the community.

"No, I wanted to get back into it," he said. "I thought, well, I've got to have something to do, so that's looking after the community. "I missed the driving, taking these people up. And you know all the other shuttle drivers that come from Dannevirke, Pahīatua, Feilding, they come in and you sort of get to know them all."

Pedersen was nominated for an ASB Good as Gold award by fellow Rongotea Lions Club member Bernard Lilburn.

"He's just such a good, humble man," Lilburn said. "When we heard about the assault, and it just really knocked him around, I thought how can we make something good from something horrible?"

Pedersen won the award, which was normally accompanied by \$10,000 – \$5000 to the individual and \$5000 to their community cause of choice.

But Pedersen said he didn't need the money and wanted it all to go to the shuttle service.

Up until he was assaulted, he was driving the shuttle two days a week, and often more when it was busy.

"I've enjoyed it because you pick up a lot of people that you know, that you talk to.

"I took a lady up one day, and she went in, and she came back. 'I can hear, I can hear,' she said, 'I'm 64.' I said 'well I'm sorry, but you've got an 82-year-old driving you home'. Well, she hardly said another word after that."


